Camp Memories

I'm writing *not* about the great, positive impact that camps made in my life, though they did, but rather about the effect I watched come to be with campers at a diocesan camp in Virginia when I was the summer chaplain over four summers.

Each cabin of campers was responsible for the daily camp worship on a rotation. During the full camp term I (and Sheila, when she wasn't out saving the world, and our daughters) lived in an early 20th-Century cabin built by an Episcopal medical missionary. I invited each group of campers to come to the front porch of the little cabin, where they sat cross-legged all around, with their counselor, and we planned worship.

Planning worship went like this: I would ask the cabin group if they wanted to talk about an idea, a question, or if they'd rather start with a story from the Bible, and move from that place to the questions and ideas. Whichever path they chose, we would then dive into the conversation, for about an hour.

At the end of the hour, we looked back at the conversation, and picked out what seemed most important to us all. I would then suggest how they might begin to move from these central points to a worship service. When they all said cheery good-byes and scooted on to the next activity, it would be the last involvement I had in their worship planning or in the service itself.

At the worship service, I would typically sit in the back bench of

the outdoor chapel at the camp. I was always impressed, wowed to see them address questions at the center of life, questions that would be with them as they grew up and lived their adult lives.

At the most obvious level, these campers learned how capable they were to plan and lead worship, worship that was beautiful, funny, thought provoking, moving. Below that, they learned that it was possible to talk about hard-to-talk-about ideas, in a Christian community. They learned that the Christian community represents Christ, the divine, present with them, in all our questions, our laughing and our tears, and, there at camp, in dirt and rain, and hot sun filtered through leafy trees.

Those campers are now in their late 20s and their 30s. Some of them have faced immense challenges, immeasurable loss and tragedy. It is my hope that the way God met them on that concrete-slab porch hanging on the front of an old cabin, or in the chapel, assured them that God would always meet them in their lives, wherever they found themselves. And, I hope that the cabin and the camp got imprinted in their hearts, the acorn-like model of the Christian community, and that they find that living presence wherever they go, whenever they need.

The past two months at The Bishop's Ranch have been no less than

spectacular. I joined
AmeriCorps
NCCC (National
Civilian
Community
Corps) with the
hopes of traveling
to places I haven't
been before and
meeting great
people. Both of
these goals of mine
were completely
fulfilled the day I

first met The Bishop's Ranch, the land around it, and the staff that would be supervising and working with me.

My AmeriCorps team, Silver 3, was assigned to live and work at The Bishop's Ranch for two months to enhance the trails, reduce risk of wild fire by removing fuel, and tend to other various needs at the Ranch. Our work was strenuous, but at the end of the day, the warm soup from the kitchen and the irreplaceable humor and kindness from the staff made it worthwhile.

Originally, I had mistakenly assumed all of our work would be merely fuel removal and trail building. However, the maintenance staff and their ongoing flexibility made work much easier by providing numerous projects and tasks to keep the work from becoming monotonous. During my time on the Ranch, I was able to clear trails, make new trails, and remove several hundred pounds of brush and logs from the Keepo Canyon and Gina's Orchard areas. Also, when the weather made those tasks more difficult, I was assigned to other projects

like restoring many outdoor furniture pieces, painting the five-bedroom Harrison

House, and helping the maintenance staff complete an entire fence around the duck pond.

Along with the diversity in the projects, the maintenance staff found even more ways to keep the smiles on our faces. Within our first two weeks of work, the team and I were surprised one

day as we were pulled aside to receive special training on an excavator. This was followed with trainings for the tractor, motorized mower, and even blacksmithing.

When we were done working hard and wanted to play hard, the staff decided to join us. They played Ultimate Frisbee with us often after work, and were really good competitors, too! At the end of the week, I always had gained something new; whether it was a new cool bruise or an incredible experience with powerful

In any experience, the memories you make all come from the people you are with, and the people at The Bishop's Ranch really made for an amazing two months for us. To teach these wobbly creatures


how to drink Rather than suck their meals— When they finish, bucket



Eco-Pilgrimage - July 9 to 16, 2011

The Russian River, with headwaters in Mendocino county, northeast of the town of Ukiah, flows past many villages, ranches, roads and open areas through its 1500 square mile watershed. The Bishop's Ranch sits on terraces above the river's Middle Reach, near Healdsburg. Just downstream of the Ranch, the river turns sharply west and trends toward the sea. St. Dorothy's Rest lies among the redwood covered hills south of the Lower Reach, not far from the river's mouth at the village of Jenner.

The Eco-Pilgrimage is a journey of the body by boat, foot and

in vehicles, from the Middle Reach to the sea; from The Bishop's Ranch to St. Dorothy's Rest. It will be a

journey of prayer and learning. Along the way, we will talk to those who know the river and its tributaries intimately. We will meet those who study the great fish returning to the river each year, those who grow grapes for the remarkable wines of the region, and those who study the river's movement through the ages. Holding in mind the stories we hear along the way, we will learn, give praise and pray for the watershed and the living things that rely on it for joy and sustenance. Chapel of St. George

The Chapel of St. George has been transformed by the addition of stained glass windows celebrating St. Francis' Canticle to the Sun. The windows, by artist Irmi Steding (www.irmiglass. com), depict scenes from the song-prayer written by St. Francis in the last years of his life. They offer a wonderful connection to the world of nature, including humans, that the Ranch itself celebrates. Their warmth and color add



immeasurably to the richness of our worship space. Irmi also constructed a stunning window near the Chapel entrance honoring our praise of God through music.

She has now turned her attention to the last window, on the stairs to the choir loft, which will honor the long history of the Diocese at the Ranch. About \$1,800 of the \$10,000 needed has been raised from individuals around the Diocese for this window. A gift to the Diocesan window fund will help complete the resplendent Chapel transformation.

A beautiful version of the text of the Canticle (as written in the windows) done in calligraphy by Elizabeth Fifield, daughter of Dick and Patty Ford, now hangs on the back wall of the chapel. A flyer with the words of the Canticle as sung by St. Francis and his monks and a bit of its history is available in the narthex. We plan to add a flyer giving the history of the chapel and its art in the near future. New lighting in the back of the chapel has been installed, to the joy of our pianists.

In December, the community that worships at the Chapel donated funds to purchase coast redwood trees to be planted in the memorial grove behind the parking lot a short distance from the pond. These additional trees will add to the buffer between the lot and the dairy and are given in gratitude for the Ranch and for the beauty of its land. The first tree in this group was planted at Christmas time and was a memorial gift from Jordan Enev. We walked out (in the rain, of course!) to the spot for a special blessing of the tree following our Eucharist on a Sunday just after Christmas.

Daily morning and evening prayer services are offered in the chapel by our prayer resident Pavan Lewis who will be with us through April. In May, David Keller and Emily Wilmer will serve as officiants at daily prayers. While they are here they will also offer a retreat "Learning to Listen to the Life Within" May 22 - May 23 and a course "Lord Teach Us To Pray" on Wednesday evenings from 7:30-9:00 PM on May 4, 11, 18, and 25. Our prayer residents during the summer months are Alliee DeArmond and Laurie Glover.




Camp Creates Christian Community



spring vegetable frittata

This works well as a brunch dish or a light dinner entree. The potatoes, onions, & asparagus may be prepared the day before to save time.

Makes 8 to 10 servings.

1/2 lb Yukon Gold potatoes, skin on, diced into 1/2 in. cubes

1 medium yellow onion, thinly sliced

1/2 lb asparagus, trimmed & cut in 1/2 in. diagonal slices Mild olive oil to coat vegetables & saute garlic, about 1/2 cup

2 medium garlic cloves, minced

10 eggs

2 cups grated sharp Cheddar cheese 1/4 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese 2 tablespoons chopped Italian parsley Pinch of cayenne pepper Salt & pepper Preheat oven to 450° F. Each vegetable will roast in a different amount of time, so keep them separate as you work with them. Toss the potatoes, onion, and aparagus with oil and sprinkle with salt. Roast the vegetables in the oven, turning with a spatula to ensure even roasting. Leave them in until they are starting to brown, about 15 minutes for potatoes and onions, 10 minutes for asparagus. If preparing ahead, let cool and store in the refrigerator overnight or until needed.

Preheat the oven to 300° F. Briefly saute garlic in a small amount of olive oil. (If potatoes, onion, and asparagus have been refrigerated, heat them up in this same pan before proceeding.) In a large bowl, crack the eggs and whisk them together. Add the vegetable mixture, cheeses, and parsley. Stir together and season with salt, pepper, and cayenne.

Pour into an oiled 9 by 13 glass Pyrex pan or equivalent ovenproof casserole dish. Bake until the top is puffed and starting to brown. This will take approximately 1 hour.
